# LINKS BETWEEN THE LEVREAULT DE LANGIS AND FRIGON FAMILIES Robert Frigon (2)

Note from the editor: This article by the late Robert Frigon (2), was written in 1998 as part of his 'Glanures.'' We have changed the title.

Before the Conquest, France possessed almost all of America, a territory dotted with forts and trading posts and crisscrossed by travelers from Lower Canada in search of fur. This large territory coveted by England changed allegiance after the "Seven Years War" which kept European powers busy. Given the considerable force of American and British armies on the continent, France had to capitulate and give up all American possessions, keeping only Louisiana. The final battle sealing the fate of Canada was fought on Quebec heights in the fall of 1759 and spring of 1760. The historic report of these events that took place between 1756 and 1760 left by Antoine de Bougainville is as valuable for this period as were the writings of the Baron La Hontan half a century earlier. His diary, full of observations about Indians and Canadians, mentions a soldier, under various names: Sieur de Langy, Sieur Langy Montégron, Sieur Langy-Levreault and also Langy l'Ainé. We must assume that he refers to a single person, but perhaps there were three brothers, all three sons of Joseph Leon Levreau de Maisonneuve. This Langy was an ensign, a sort of lieutenant in charge of minor military commands<sup>1</sup>.

The very first time Bougainville mentions the Sieur de Langy in his account, he is said to be part of a reconnaissance mission with a group of Indians in the vicinity of Fort Oswego [Chouagan] in the summer of 1756 to assess enemy forces. Located south of Lake Ontario near the current Syracuse, Oswego fortifications were of real importance to both sides, this lake being the natural corridor used by traders and merchants.

Subsequently, Sieur de Langy appears to have been used as a "scout", responsible for avant-garde missions. At the head of troops composed of Canadians and Indians, he made many prisoners and gathered information on the British army. Of course, his warriors also brought back "scalps", over twenty of those during an expedition on Lake Champlain in December 1757<sup>2</sup>. According to Bougainville, the Knight Langy was also sent as a delegate to meet both British and American commanding officers.

In many ways, it is clear from the writings of Bougainville, aide-de-camp to the Marquis de Montcalm, that this officer had unusual leadership qualities. He mentions his name as a scout leading the Indian troops over twenty times. The boldest of the three brothers was, apparently, Jean-Baptiste Levreau de Langy, husband of Madeleine d'Ailleboust. Although born in Canada, he went on to France in 1760. It was not healthy for him to stay in the country.

Joseph-Léon Levreau de Langy, husband of Marguerite Trottier and later of Marguerite Jarret of Verchères, arrived in the country with the troops in 1687. This ancient noble family was originally from Poitou. Since he died in 1740, he is not the one Bougainville refers to in his writings. Established in Champlain where his two wives gave him ten children, Joseph-Léon is the ancestor of the Langis family in Mauricie.

It appears from the writings of the time that four of the boys embraced the military career. Jacques-Joseph Langy (1708 - 1777), husband of Marie-Anne Chorel Dorvilliers, was an officer in the army, as well as Alexis, the "knight", who drowned in Longueuil in 1760. Antoine-Joseph de Langy was an aiguillette cadet, and finally, the boldest, Jean-Baptiste de Langy was an ensign in the Canadian army.

Our research on the Frigon family in Champlain lead us to dvelve on this military family. It seems likely that after the capitulation, the descendants of the ancestor Langy became farmers and military exploits were nothing more than memories.

Strangely, links are forged between the Langy and the Frigon families. And these links are durable as shown by at least four known marriages. Elisabeth Frigon, born in 1767 in La Pérade, first daughter of Paul Frigon and Ursule Lefebvre, was married in 1788 to Antoine-Léon Levreau de Langy, son of Joseph and Anne Dorvilliers. The wedding

They have eaten an English officer whose pallor and plumpness tempted them".

ceremony was held in Joliette. Here is a bit of noble blood mixed with the blood of the ancestor François Frigon "said Spanish". In the records, Antoine Levreau Langy is said to be "escuyer".

Another Joseph de Langy, born in Batiscan in 1744, son of Marie-Anne Dorvilliers, married Marie-Anne Roy around 1779. He is the brother-inlaw of Elizabeth Frigon. One of his son, Jean-Baptiste Langis, born in 1783, married Madeleine Frigon in 1807 in Champlain. Later, Angèle de Langis, daughter of Elizabeth Frigon, married Pierre Frigon, brother of Madeleine Frigon in 1814 in Batiscan. Very close links must have existed between the De Langy and the Frigon families.


It should also be noted that the family of the late Paul Frigon left Joliette around 1790 and moved to Rivière-du-Loup. It is also likely that a son of Olivier Frigon and Judith Banhiac, farmers in the de Carufel seigneury, would visit family in


